Mr Mike Bridgwood

Mr Bridgwood was appointed by the head teacher at the time, Mr Harris, in 1994 and was given the position as a year 5 class teacher. Mike quickly became a key member of staff and was given additional duties of not only of an academic nature... bizarrely one of them was to keep the chlorine levels right in the school swimming pool!

Mike became renowned for his amazing creative assemblies and love of drama. This turned into drama clubs and his input and direction on the year 6 leavers' plays. When I first started at Warden Hill, I remember being in awe of the productions and how involved Mike would get, how much he cared for the children in performing their best, getting them to practice their voices and their line delivery till it was perfect; the end results were exceptional! In later years, I had the privilege of him helping out on one of our Year 6 productions. You never knew what you were going to get from one rehearsal to the next with Mike, as he would suddenly go off script and add another line in here, a cameo role there and I was left frantically penciling in the changes and then he would casually turn to me and say - 'You got that, yeah?' Needless to say, the play was always better off from a 'Bridgwood' touch.

In his early career Mike was heavily involved in the school sports and coached and led the very successful athletics and football teams for a number of years – the football team at the time under his remit made it

to the district finals 5 years in a row. In the classroom, where possible, he would always make the learning come alive and it wouldn't be uncommon to see him walking around dressed as a pirate, or a caveman, or as a wounded soldier from WWII as part of the Year 2 Florence Nightingale unit of work – Mrs Courtman and Mr Bridgwood made such a good double act!



And his talents didn't stop there. He specifically learnt to play the guitar to run a guitar club for the children, his class assemblies were legendary with humour, singing and a creative take on the children's learning. As a staff he kept us on our toes in our 'one stop wonder' rehearsal for the school panto – giving stage directions, organising the songs and yes children and parents...even telling us off when we were talking too much and not concentrating on the practice! He would also regale stories of past events in school and as staff he would have us on the edge our seats (and invariably laughing) – he would always bring a bit of light relief at the end of a staff meeting.

He has taught many children over his time, but to have children he has taught come back as teachers to our school says a lot: Mr Herbert, Mrs Andrews and Mr Williams can put testament to his brilliant teaching abilities. However, inevitably change happens and sadly for us, Mike has decided that it is time to leave Warden Hill and move onto other ventures.

In his time with us he has taught over 840 children, worked with 28 different year group partners, he has taught 28 different classes, he has taught in 5 different year groups (2,3,4,5,6) he has had four different Headteachers, but for us - there will only ever be one Mr Bridgwood.

Mike, I know that all of us will miss you deeply and our school will be a very different place without you but we wish you all the very best with everything that your future holds

From all of us at Warden Hill, children, staff, parents past and present – quite simply thank you for everything you gave to our school.

Sports Week

The final week of spring term saw all of our pupils compete in our annual sports week. Throughout sports week, the children get the opportunity to compete in house rounders, house frisbee, field events (KS2 only) and each key stage also has its own sports day. We were blessed with perfect weather conditions for the week, overcast but warm, and the children competed admirably all the way through. It was the perfect celebration of sport at Warden Hill.

HOUSE ROUNDERS

Over the first few days of the week, each year group competed in house rounders. For the infants, this consisted of kick rounders and for the juniors it took its more traditional form. Scores were collated by our fantastic house, vice and sports captains and the results were as follows:



FIELD EVENTS

Our KS2 children competed in the field events on Wednesday, which consisted of four different events:

- standing long jump
- shot put
- discus
- vortex throw

Each child was selected for at least one event where they competed against other members of their class or year group, ranking first through fourth depending on results. The results for the event were totalled and (for the first time in living memory!) the field events trophy was awarded to two houses.





HOUSE FRISBEE

On the final Friday of spring term, Mr Roberts and his coaches took all of the children for a house frisbee session. This involved developing the skills of throwing and catching the Frisbee, accruing points for houses depending on how quickly and accurately the children threw. The day culminated in the playing of the house Frisbee tournament, in which each house won one, drew one and lost one. This meant that the points from the morning events were all important and the results were as follows:

Athletics Festival

On Friday 17th June over 40 of our pupils went to the Prince of Wales stadium to compete in the Cotswold Shield Athletics Festival. The Cotswold Division is the top division of 3, and this pitted Warden Hill against the top 11 schools based on their performance at previous editions of the athletics festival.

Our pupils competed brilliantly – not only was it many pupils' first time competing in a stadium and in that environment, but also with it being the hottest day of the year so far!

The children's performances throughout the afternoon were incredible: our year 5 and 6 children competed valiantly in the 600m and 800m; our field event athletes threw and jumped to their best abilities (many of them competing alongside their track events); our individual sprinters were brilliant, racing under the noses of a boisterous crowd of pupils, parents and staff; and our relay teams were incredible in their respective 4 x 50m and 4 x 100m races. We had a high number of finalists in the sprints and relay races (Warden Hill made 6 of the 8 relay finals!) and our medallists were Evie B – who came second in her 100m sprint – and the Year 5 girls relay team – who also came second by a matter of centimetres in their relay final.

Overall, we finished a very creditable joint 7th of the 12 competing schools - a brilliant achievement against some very stiff competition. All of the attending Warden Hill staff were extremely proud of how our children behaved and performed! Well done everyone!































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Science Festival: Year 5

Year 5 had brilliant time at the Cheltenham Science Festival. We started the day completing a Science Trail around the site, finding out about some amazing animals and plants.

After that, we went into the Town Hall where we met Dr Sheila Kanani who describes herself as a space cadet, with her head high up in the clouds even when her feet are firmly on planet Earth. We found out that Sheila became interested in space and astronomy at the age of 13, and her passion sky-rocketed from there. She shared with us many facts about Space as well as inspiring our children to consider following a career in the space industry by sharing her book How To Be An Astronaut And Other Space Jobs.

After lunch, we visited the MakerShack where our children explored an incredible range of creative activities. They learnt how to impale an inflated balloon with a skewer without it popping, how to program a robot, make a flower seed bomb, make a model mosquito and even use Lego to create towers that were taller than themselves! What a brilliant day!

Year 5: Forest of Dean Trip

Year 5 visited the Forest of Dean to develop their geographical field work skills.

First, we visited New Fancy View Point where we looked at a 'geomap' which showed the Forest of Dean's geology and historical land use. Our children used this to learn about past land uses of the forest and to draw their own maps.

Next, we visited Beechenhurst where our children walked through the forest, experiencing the sights and sounds. They identified the layers of the temperate deciduous forest and compared these with the layers of a rainforest. Back in class the children used what they learnt on our trip to compare land use in the Forest of Dean to that of the rainforest in Brazil.
